>>> NEWS FROM THE FALL/WINTER ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

At this year's Fall AGM, 46 society members gathered, marking an impressive turnout that pleased the board. Financial statements for the 2023/2024 year had been distributed in advance, allowing members time to review them prior to the meeting. The AGM was opened by Daryn Kobes, Board Chair, with the financial statements as the primary focus of the discussions.

The finance committee reported that the school remains on track to implement a 3% annual tuition increase to address the rising costs of operating the school. This adjustment is seen as more than reasonable, considering British Columbia's inflation rate of 2.4% and projected salary increases in BC of 3.9%. The proposal received strong support from society members, with several expressing gratitude for the board's efforts to maintain affordability for all families while ensuring the school's sustainability.


The meeting concluded with the School Board and Administration offering prayers of thanks to the Lord for His continued care of Houston Christian School, especially during these uncertain financial times. They acknowledged the Lord's hand in guiding the school through challenges and providing wisdom in every decision. 

An interview with an HCS Alumnus

Talk about your life journey graduating from HCS.

After graduating from HCS, I went on to Prairie Bible College. Originally, I planned to enroll at Columbia College in Abbotsford, but two weeks before the semester began, I felt led by the Lord to choose Prairie instead. My family spent a lot of time in Alberta growing up, and I have extended family there, so that didn't feel like too far of a stretch for a test flight. Plus, the fact that it is located in the very small town of Three Hills appealed to me. I moved to Three Hills and pursued a Bachelor of Arts in Intercultural Studies. While



there, I found some very interesting doors opening along the way. Ultimately, I ended up with an associate's degree and toured with a worship band formed on campus by several other musicians. We had the opportunity to write and record original music and travel across Canada and down the western United States. I went to Three Hills, imagining that I would be a piano teacher and pursue classical music. I ended up being offered the opportunity to write and record original music and work with a record company in Nashville, TN. This was all so outside of anything I could really comprehend, and looking back, I see how it actually felt surreal most of the time. God is so good and so faithful in His care for me. I was 18 when this all started and 21 by the time I moved to Nashville with no idea what to expect! He surrounded me with people who looked after me and invested in me, and I was truly adopted by the most wonderful and loving family, who had me live with them just outside of Nashville. They are dear to this day. I met many wonderful people and had some amazing opportunities.

After recording an album with Reunion Records, I realized that I wasn't quite ready to fully commit to a career in Contemporary Christian Music. I stayed in Nashville,



collaborating on songwriting with other artists and working as a session singer for songwriters. I also had the opportunity to perform at some amazing venues, including the Blue Bird Café. After 5 years in Nashville, I met my husband Greg through a mutual friend, and we got married and moved to his hometown in Illinois. We spent nine years in Illinois until the call of the Rockies became irresistible, leading us to move to Colorado. We have three wonderful kids, and we are truly enjoying these years. We are currently

homeschooling, driving places, and thanking God for it all. Music has taken a back seat in many ways over the years, but it has been a joy to serve where I can. I have accompanied school choirs, taught some lessons, worked with songwriters and helped on the music teams at church. My kids are musical little critters, so it's been fun to watch as they develop their own musical talents while we play together. God is so good.

How did the education you received from HCS impact this journey?

HCS played a crucial role in shaping my self-expectations and also in determining what education would look like for my kids. In hindsight, I appreciate the educational and spiritual formation that the leadership of HCS has cultivated. What a gift to have believers to guide and cheer for you through the teen years, those years were a gift in so many ways. The teachers truly valued our development, providing us with a quality education and setting clear expectations to meet. There was an environment of mutual respect and high standards. I share with my children what my school experience was like growing up, highlighting how we were able to challenge ourselves while having fun! I have carried those standards with me, raising my kids to be critical thinkers, take on challenges confidently, and remember to have fun along the way.

How does your faith impact how you see your role as a Mother?

"Christ is my firm foundation" is a worship song lyric that really sums it up and Luke 6:47-49 really speaks to how the Lord has led in my life. I have not always walked closely with the Lord, but the testimonies of faith, sacrifice and hope I was surrounded with in my school years were a huge anchor that never really let go through it all and drew me back to ultimately surrendering my life to Christ. Of all the interesting jobs I have had, I can say with confidence that none has required me to adapt as quickly and frequently as being a stay-athome mom. That is my profession, and I have been doing it for 15 years now. I am so thankful to have this time with my kids and to have the opportunities that it affords. Making the change from full-time musician to stay-at-home mom in a new town surrounded by strangers was a huge change, and motherhood has been the great revealer of where I place my faith, how I respond to trials, and how I quantify success.



What about HCS has stayed with you?

Honestly, the fun! I love how the teachers shared about their life experiences and how God worked in their lives. I also love how if we showed the teachers we could work, they would also let us play! Having been through several different school systems with my own family it is now so clear what a blessing that whole environment was.

Recall a fond memory of your time at HCS.

Miss Gunther was so special to me. I'm still so thankful for her part in my life. I have a core memory of the whole school in the gym (the old one). Miss. Gunther had taught each class a couple of rounds of a song, and she led the entire school in joining the rounds together like a well-oiled machine, acapella. The beauty of it is still with me.

I was part of the first Grade 11 and 12 classes at HCS and I helped my dad build the high school addition. Man, there was a lot of tile in those high school shower rooms!

I was part of Chi Rho getting started (Thursday Morning Sing); singing and having chapel time together was amazing.

FOSTERING FOCUS AND FAITH: HCS CELL PHONE USE POLICIES

Across British Columbia, schools have introduced updated cell phone use policies in response to new government guidelines aimed at enhancing the educational environment. At HCS, we're committed to fostering a positive and productive learning experience rooted in our shared Christian values. Our cell phone policies are designed to support our students' success both academically and spiritually, encouraging them to use technology responsibly and with discernment. Cell phone policies are crafted to balance the rights of students with the expectations of parents, who play an essential role in their children's growth. By limiting cell



phone use, we can ensure a safe, respectful, and focused learning atmosphere. These policies also address challenges such as classroom disruptions and the misuse of devices, helping students better engage with their lessons while maintaining appropriate boundaries for personal technology.

Responsible Cell Phone Use at HCS

HCS has taken a thoughtful approach to cell phone use, tailored to the unique needs of our students. For elementary and middle school students, personal electronic devices are discouraged during school hours to create a distraction-free environment that supports their social and academic development. High school students, recognizing their increasing independence, are permitted to use their phones during non-instructional times. This approach strikes a balance between encouraging responsible device usage and maintaining focus during instructional periods. Teachers often say "permission is key" when it comes to using cell phones out of dedicated time.

To ensure the effectiveness of these policies, consequences are clearly outlined. Phones used inappropriately will be confiscated and securely stored until the end of the school day. Repeated violations will involve parental notification to foster a collaborative effort in guiding responsible phone use.

HOPE IN CHRIST



H stands for Houston, of course—our home and community.

S stands for School because we are an educational institution.

And C? C stands for Christian. Being a Christian means following Jesus Christ.

This school in this town stands on Christ as its foundation—a core value. He is the Lord and Master of all we do. It's no surprise, then, that when HCS speaks and lives with hope, that hope is firmly rooted in Jesus Christ, whose birth we joyfully celebrate every Christmas.

There is something in the word "hope" that has an incompleteness about it. In Romans 8, the apostle Paul describes it this way: "For in this hope [redemption] we were saved. But hope that is seen is no hope at all. Who hopes for what they already have? But if we hope for what we do not yet have, we wait for it patiently." I remember once hoping to receive a bicycle as a gift. That hope became a reality, and the moment it did, I stopped hoping for it. Funny how that works. On the other hand, I had another gift on my Christmas list for years but never received it. Eventually, I stopped hoping for it, though it took longer. In the process, I grew up. It would be strange to ask for it now. Hope for something can be like that. It evolves with time, shaping our desires and expectations. When hope is fulfilled, it gives way to gratitude and joy. When it is left unmet, it can teach us resilience and the bittersweet art of letting go. But true hope—the kind of hope Paul speaks of-goes beyond material desires or fleeting wishes. It anchors us in something deeper, something eternal. This kind of hope isn't meant to fade or be outgrown.

The Bible frequently uses the word hope. And when it's not being used, hope is active in the background of everything in the Old and New Testaments. Often, the word hope is used in the everyday way all people use it. "I hope for this gift," "I hope the economy improves," or "I hope I get a good grade—I did my best, after all." But then there's the hope for God's full redemption in the coming of the Messiah—a hope the people held on to for generations. At last, Jesus was born. God's promise "to save his people from their sins." (Matthew 1:21) became a reality.

The Apostle Peter wrote to Christians who were going through hard times, which he described as a "fiery ordeal." He wrote, "always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope you have "(1 Peter 3:15). Maybe the H in HCS can also stand for "Hope. In Christ, we always have hope, "for what we do not yet have." As students, staff, board members, parents, and supporters, we lean on Christ. We trust in His plan of grace, even when times seem bleak. No matter the circumstances, we find comfort in knowing He is always with us, and we are always with Him. He is alive today, and we know He is coming back. This hope inspires us—and it's a hope we can share.

During this season, may the celebration of God's gift of salvation from sin in Jesus Christ bring peace and comfort to each of us. At the same time, let's ground our ongoing hope in God's daily faithfulness and love as we await Jesus's promised things new.
